We do ask that we all prayerfully commit to considering whether our giving might be able to be increased for the coming year. We fully understand, though, that this might not be a possibility for some of our church members. Simon Wainscot is our church 'Gift Aid' secretary and is happy to chat, in confidence, to anyone who is interested to find out about how to make their giving more tax efficient. As a church we claim tax back from the government. This increases our income by 25% so is worth doing whenever possible.

Our prayer is that we continue to build on all that has been achieved and grow further to make this next year one that will be full of blessings and examples of the movement of the Holy Spirit amongst us.

The £10 underpaid by the funeral directors should be written off I feel.


All deposit accounts have been kept meticulously and transferred as appropriate out of redundant funds.

Introduction

This has been a very encouraging year. If you look at the Income and Endowments section, you will see we have had an increase in every area. This has resulted in the overall increase in funds instead of the predicted deficit.

Restricted and designated funds relate to grants and donations for specific things such as Administrator salary and the English Class

Notes to the Accounts 2024

1. The Administrator Salary Grant for 2025 was received in 2024.
2. A funeral fee, paid in the correct amount to the diocese, was received £10 short from the funeral director. I recommend this is now written off.
3. The Christingle Service collection of £23.45 was received in 2024 and paid into the bank in 2025.
4. The amount of £361 was transferred from a redundant designated fund to the general fund on the agreement of the PCC.
5. A small excess of Income (£1279) was achieved compared to a small deficit (£1446) last year despite a budget prediction of a £4000 deficit.
6. The apparent cash deficit occurs, principally, because cash received in Dec 2023 was banked in Jan 2024.

RUGBY DEANERY SYNOD REPORT

July 2024 – December 2024

The Deanery Synod meets three times per year.

Overview

This report summarises the key events, discussions, and developments across the Rugby Deanery Synod meetings from July 2024 to December 2024, encompassing the third and fourth meetings of the 25th Synod session.

Third Meeting – Tuesday 16 July 2024

Venue: St Peter's Church, Grandborough

Keynote Speaker: Bishop Ruth Worsley

Bishop Ruth delivered an uplifting address focusing on *Children & Angels in the Church*. She encouraged Synod members to reflect on who had inspired their faith, which led to several heartfelt testimonies. Emphasising the importance of taking the Church to the community — especially to children — she urged that young people must be given a voice within Church life.

Following a break with the usual excellent refreshments, +Ruth answered a range of questions from members of the Synod.

Fourth Meeting – Tuesday 26 November 2024

Venue: St Mark's Church, Bilton

Keynote Speaker: Revd April Gold (Diocesan Director of Education and Curate at Hillmorton)

Revd April provided an update on developments within Diocesan Schools, notably the partnership between the DBS and **iSingPOP**, led for the Diocese by Emma Kenyon. She proposed a summer-term event at Harris School for Church of England primary schools within the Deanery, to support children as they transition to secondary education. A statistical summary and an iSingPOP flier were circulated separately.

Deanery Trends Report – Steve Gold

Steve Gold presented trends from 2012–2024:

- **Sunday attendance:** ↓ 40%
- **Worshipping communities:** ↓ 20%
- **Regular givers:** ↓ 40%
- **Giving (real terms):** ↓ approximately 40%, due to the impact of inflation

Parish reserves are declining, and diocesan subsidies are increasing annually. This trend may become critical unless action is taken, particularly given that the Deanery had previously returned a surplus prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.

MISSION AND MINISTRY TEAM – DISCIPLESHIP REPORT

The Wednesday evening bible study group has continued to meet over Zoom throughout 2024. This is a special time of the week where a small group learn more about the bible as we study the passages from the previous Sunday's service together. Each week is a time of blessing as we encourage each other and become more familiar with such a wonderful book. Our different experiences and backgrounds have allowed us to discuss issues together to gain more understanding of the bible and practical applications of the teachings. It has been inspiring to see people's faith grow. Using Zoom enables people to meet on occasions where they have not been well or mobile enough to journey to church and avoids inclement weather as well as saving on fuel! The ends of the sessions come much too quickly. It is good to be part of a group of our Christian family who can support each other through the challenges of life and share the joys too.

Once a month we meet for prayer instead of bible study and are able to pray for those on the prayer chain, others we know of in need of prayer, our church congregations and wider issues. We are also encouraged as we share how good God has been to us in answering our prayer, sometimes in ways we would not have expected!

The benefice prayer chain continues to be a source of help and encouragement as we circulate requests for prayer via text and email for any prayer requests received. It has also been helpful to circulate updates to the prayer requests with answers to prayer. There are no 'rules' restricting who and what we pray for – if somebody or a situation is in need of prayer, then we can circulate it. God is never too busy to hear us. Sometimes we feel that we cannot participate in things because of other commitments or health issues, but we can always pray, and it is a blessing to be part of that support. Any requests for prayer should be directed to Sharon or Ruth, and if you would like to join in praying for others in this way please let Ruth know.

We also have opportunities to be part of a larger church family. A few of us were able to join the annual March of Witness on Good Friday in the town centre. It is an opportunity to meet with other Christians, some of whom have previously worshipped at Christ Church, while not being scared to show that we are Christians and that Good Friday is not just another Bank Holiday. Many people in this country today will be unaware of the significance of the day but might be encouraged to find out why there is a large crowd of people assembled. The march always ends with hot cross buns at St Andrews, so a chance to catch up with old friends and make new ones as well.

It is good to join with more of the worldwide church family. At midnight on New Year's Eve, we were encouraged to be part of a worldwide prayer for peace which circulated round the globe. People were asked to pray at midnight, but as not everybody wants to stay awake for midnight, earlier would be OK as it would be midnight somewhere in the world! This is an annual event which we can be part of.

Another annual event which we can participate in is organised by Premier Christian Radio and United Christian Broadcasters on a Sunday each January. People are encouraged to pray the Lord's Prayer at noon, so this is something we can do, either by ourselves or together after the morning service and coffee. There is something powerful about being part of something large.

As disciples of Christ, it is important that we continue to grow in our faith. Bible study and prayer are an important part of this. If you are not already involved in the regular bible study group and would like to be participate at some other time of the week, please let Ruth know as we are hoping to facilitate this. Previous expressions of interest did not materialise as there were not enough people with the same availability to form new groups, but as our church family is growing, this might now be possible. The group who currently meet find that this is a really valuable time of the week and look forward to the sessions so it would be good for others to experience this for themselves.

MISSION AND MINISTRY TEAM – WORSHIPING GOD REPORT

Two of the memorable highlights of this year have been an increased number of men coming to the Men's Monthly Breakfast and the participation of the language students performing at the Carol Service.

We very sadly lost two precious members of the Men's breakfast group and we miss Mel and Malcolm for their friendship and contribution to this monthly get together. The group has grown in number and has about 30% of men who do not attend regular Church services. We see this very much as an important way of breaking down barriers. At each session we discuss a topic and each man has one minute to speak, these topics have included 'Where is God when it hurts' 'Which political party would Jesus have voted for at the last general election' and 'How can someone have Faith when things look bleak'.

The topics seem to engage people's attention and always end up trying to explain where God, Christ and the Holy Spirit fit into our everyday lives.

The food we eat is donated and people are asked that if God has given them a little extra, would they kindly share some of that with the work of the Church.

I would especially like to thank Pete for his cookery skills and all the guys who volunteer to wash up.

One of the most moving scenes we have seen in Church happened at the Carol Service where members of the group learning English as a foreign language acted out a modern take on the Christmas Story and then one of their daughters played and sang a popular Chinese song. But what elevated this for me was when her microphone was not working well she was joined by her Father and Uncle who sang with her, and isn't this a great metaphor for our Heavenly Father stepping into this world to save us?

MISSION AND MINISTRY TEAM – TRANSFORMING COMMUNITIES REPORT

This year we have continued the good work with a lot of community events happening, and a few changes. with a real feeling that the Spirit is at work in the community. Most of these have their separate reports,

Continuing events are Brownsover Family Winter Project and Monday Lunch Club, Men's Breakfast, Ladies Craft, Teddy Bears, Meet & Eat, Art Group.

We did not manage to get the Men's Chippie night running; Elmer no longer visits Brownsover; and Rainbows and Brownies moved to the Community Centre.

However, we started Elmer's Friends at the church to support the young families from Whernside in particular, and a Conversational English Course to help Migrants from Hong Kong. This was supported by WCC Migrant Communities Grant Fund, and most of you will remember the brilliant Nativity Play and Carols sung in Cantonese.

The Brownsover Winter project ran on just 2 nights per week this year. The numbers were lower than last year and tailed off a bit after Christmas. Still, we helped a total of 13 families, served nearly 800 meals and at Christmas delivered 47 hampers to families and elderly people.

Little Squirrels and MoveltOrLoselt have hired the Church to provide services to the community.

Looking at we have done got me thinking about the teams of dedicated volunteers who have cooked, served and washed up for Brownsover Winter Project, Brownsover Family Lunch Club, Men's Breakfast and Meet & Eat etc: collected, bagged up and delivered Christmas Hampers, served refreshments and chatted to students at the ESOL classes, met and helped families at Teddy Bears and Friends of Elmer. Volunteers come from the wider community as well as the church and we have created great teams that make things happen. I've been asked by some BFWP volunteers if we can organise a get together event in the summer. Because of the support we give to the local community it may be time consuming, but not difficult to find grants to finance our outreach, but it would not be possible with the volunteers to run them.

Outside of the church the Brownsover Buddy Club is still running at the Children's Centre, and as few people know about it, I've added a brief report

We have had a varied clientele lately. A young person dropped by for support with their personal statement for the University, a mature student needing support to learn how to sign on to virtual lessons with the University, a citizen with support with divorce application, a client whom we had helped to extend their leave to stay - now is needing support with finding work, a family needing support in grief as they needed to know the procedures to follow to repatriate a loved one back to their home country, a query from a migrant worker on matters relating to health subsidies for migrants, an client who we have been supporting for years needing support with applying to work, food vouchers, resolving her gas card issues and applying to Severn Trent Foundation for support with bills and so on.

One of our clients passed away last month. She had received support from Buddy Club for over 15 years since.

It is good to know that we continue to make a difference to people's lives through the Buddy Club - thanks to the support we receive from the church and BCA.

PRISON MINISTRY REPORT

Prison ministry is still a very large part of my life and I am extremely grateful for all the prayers which support this work and which make such a difference.

I have tutored two Sycamore Tree courses this year and am in the middle of a two-year appointment on the Prison Fellowship (PF) Board of Trustees, representing volunteers. I continue to sit on the PF bible study editorial group and we prepare weekly bible studies for every prison in the country plus over 600 other people who have asked to receive them. I usually write one a month and have learnt so much from this and from the other members of the group. I also continue to write a monthly prayer sheet for the men at Onley. Our weekly face-to-face bible study group continues to go well with an average of 10-12 men attending each week and I also help with the Communion Service on the first Sunday of the month. Both national and local PF prayer groups meet monthly on Zoom as all the work that PF undertakes is based on prayer. The national Prayer Line, which PF organises, continues to be very popular with men and women throughout the country. They ring in with prayer requests which are then distributed to many volunteers who pray for them.

Thank you again for all your prayers for prison ministry. If anyone is interested in taking part in any aspect of this work, please don't hesitate to have a word with me.

TEDDY BEARS REPORT

Once again 2024 was a very successful year for all at Teddy Bears. Our numbers in January were as usual growing and we were lucky enough to have children still coming to a session even though they were now attending Nurseries in the local area. It is always a joy to see these older children grow in confidence and start to help the younger ones.

We have tried to keep to our numbers to no more than 25 children a session, but sometimes we have gone over. I simply find it very difficult to say no to parents, I am aware if too many are in it may become a Safeguarding /Health & Safety issue. However, I am of the opinion that to turn someone away could also become an issue, it may be the one time they have managed to get themselves out of the door.

We continue to offer crafts, games in a safe and secure place, with food and information. This group have made a network of friends and a support network that continues away from Meet & Eat.

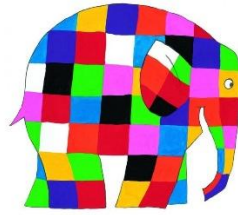

BF LUNCH CLUB REPORT

The BF lunch club is in its second year, and continues to support older people in the community, as well as people who might feel isolated and need company. The lunch club is growing and we regularly see up to 30 friends (and sometimes more!) each week. People attend from all over Rugby, including from Brownsover, Clifton and Newton.

The lunch club meets every Monday, during term time, from 11 am - 1 pm and costs £3 per person. The first hour is dedicated to playing games, chatting and drinking plenty of tea or coffee. The group share Grace and then eat lunch together, followed by a game of bingo. Lunch is a two-course meal, with a main and dessert. We typically offer one option with a salad and a heavier option such as a casserole or pasta. The dessert is usually a choice between a hot or cold option and we also have fruit for anyone that wants a lighter dessert.

A group of volunteers run the lunch club and cook different meals each week; the volunteer team has grown and three main chefs take turns leading in the kitchen. The volunteers who cook have completed food hygiene training. We recently had a food hygiene inspection by the Rugby Borough Council and received a 5 star rating! The lunch club is self-sustaining and non-profit, we make donations to Christ Church when there is a surplus of money.

The lunch club is growing in popularity and we often hear how much people enjoy attending and appreciate what we do. The atmosphere is welcoming and fun, everyone is kind and inclusive, there is a clear sense of community! We hope that the club continues to grow and we are always open to anyone wanting to volunteer with us, especially as we see more and more people attend each week.

ELECTORAL ROLL REPORT

Every six years we are required to construct a completely new electoral roll, this year being one of those years. For the first time, this was done completely electronically. Although this proved challenging for some devices, a simple solution was found by enabling forms to be completed at church – thanks to Sharon’s support for this, and it was also useful for people who had just not got round to completing the application at home.

A designated email address was set up meaning that the process was more eco-friendly and efficient and enabled for future years. There is now no need to send forms to any personal email address, no storage of any hard copies or electronic forms on personal computers, and the information was easily copied and pasted, rather than being laboriously typed out with the risk of errors, onto the electoral roll.

These numbers however, do not truly reflect the size of our worshipping community as some people did not complete an electoral roll application before the deadline and some are not eligible to. It has been encouraging to welcome new members this year, but we have lost some previous members who have moved away or are not well enough to apply, resulting in a similarly sized roll to last year despite weekly attendance appearing to increase. Of those who have moved away, some are still in contact with our church family through remaining on the prayer chain, receiving the newsletter and or attending Zoom bible study even if they are worshipping elsewhere.
